

Both schools are part of the Thinking Schools Academy Trust, which promotes critical thinking and habits of mind as part of its innovative 'Thinking School' approach.


The '6 seeds' in the book represent six habits of mind

which were carefully selected for pupils at Cedar Children's Academy so they could become efficient and effective thinkers.

At the launch, staff and parents spoke with the pupils who had authored and illustrated the book, and pupils from The Victory Academy performed a dance they had choreographed based on Dr Seuss' work. The choir at Cedar Children's Academy then treated guests to songs about different habits of mind.

The Victory Academy's important role in the book coincides with it becoming the Trust's sixth school in the South-East to achieve the prestigious 'Thinking School' accreditation from Exeter University's Cognitive Education Development Unit.



Pupils at All Faiths Children's Academy are celebrating after taking the top spot at the National Signing Choir Competition – the UK's premier contest for sign language choirs.

The All Faiths Revolutionaries entered their very first competition at professional level – and went on to bring home the title.

'Signing Choirs' are choirs that sing with their hands in British Sign Language (BSL) rather than with their voices, while telling a visual story behind the song they are performing using their hands, body and facial expressions.

The accolade was won with an inspired and energetic



performance of Justin Timberlake's "Can't Stop the Feeling" and a sign language version of "I Believe" by Yolanda Adams. Judges for the competition included Fletch (Jayne Fletcher, the Sign2Sing star), Dr Paul Whittaker OBE, and Mr Andrew Higgins.

With the third National Signing Choir Competition due to take place in March 2019, the Revolutionaries have already started practising two brand new songs, preparing to defend their title as champions.

The group has previously performed in a stage show production with Revolution Signing Choir and Sparks of Creation dance company, and have publicly showcased their Christmas selection, including a unique and original version of the "Twelve Days of Christmas". Established in September 2017, the group was created as a partnership between All Faiths Children's Academy and Revolution.

Parents and carers have highly praised the 'Signing Choir' for providing children an outlet to express themselves.

Staff were all impressed with how they all took part in the activities and the exceptional way in which the pupils represented the school with excellent behaviour.





#### **ROCK CHALLENGE 2018**

Our schools provide and take part in a multitude of events where their pupils can develop their abilities and grow in confidence. These events can include end of year shows and taking part in musical and dance competitions where pupils dedicate their time to learning lines, songs and working on choreographed dance pieces. This year, The Portsmouth Academy have taken part in the Rock Challenge 2018 competition where anybody can audition, no matter what their abilities are.

Pupils from their Year 10 dance company teach a small motif which the auditionees can then add their own dance moves to. They are then arranged into groups by the staff and dance company depending on their dance style and given the theme for the dance which was 'Scattered Seeds'.

During the weeks leading up to the main event, the groups rehearse their dances choreographed to their choice of music while costumes are designed and made to fit.

The pupils aware that the heats are moving ever closer, polished their dance routines, focusing on perfection and timing. As they returned to school in the final term they were taught the finale dance, choreographed by the dance company.

They were the first to rehearse on the day at the Rock Challenge competition heats with all schools being very supportive and kind. Isabelle, a Year 9 student at The Portsmouth Academy, said: "The whole day's experience was amazing where you got to see other schools do their rehearsals and cheer them on. There were also a lot of times where we could just free dance".

Pupils performed to the best of their abilities that night with visual expression, ensuring their timing and movement was impeccable. They had spent months working on their dance pieces and having changed back into their own clothes they entered the auditorium to hear the winning groups' announcement. They were ecstatic as they had won 13/15 awards, placed second overall and were go to regionals.

Performing at the regional finals, which were very similar to the heats, they were proud with what they had achieved. The dance group were triumphant and received many awards including 'Spirit of Rock Challenge', 'Excellence in Drama', 'Excellence in Set Design and Function' and 'Excellence for Entertainment'. Not expecting to win a place in the final, they were euphoric to be announced as second place winners.


The pupils recieved certificates, sent by Tom Palmer, as acknowledgment of their dedication.

### THE PORTSMOUTH ACADEMY PUPILS ENLIST LOCAL MP IN PLASTICS CAMPAIGN

Pupils at The Portsmouth Academy (TPA) were excited to share their pioneering efforts to reduce plastics with their MP on Friday.

TPA's Debate Team has spearheaded an impressive drive to reduce plastics at the school – and lead the way on this key environmental issue in Portsmouth.

Pupils aged 12 to 14 at the school, which is part of the Thinking Schools Academy Trust, have launched a raft of measures, including:

- Joining forces with the school's caterer, ISS, to work towards eliminating all plastics – ISS has led the way on this by ensuring all its packaging is compostable and environmentally safe, and shared their expertise with pupils
- Organising litter picks at school and on the beach
- Presenting to the whole school on the impact of plastic waste and challenging fellow pupils to adopt eco-friendly measures, such as banning all Tetra Pak packaging and developing eco-gardens
- Working with Go 4 Set to design an eco factory
- Working with younger pupils who have studied plastics pollution in Geography
- Sharing their work with other local schools as an example of best practice

Inspired by the plastics challenges faced by their local area – such as litter on Southsea beaches – they seized the opportunity to share their efforts with MP for Portsmouth South Stephen Morgan on Friday 29th June.

After updating him on their work to date, they asked his advice on how to take the campaign to the wider community, and quizzed him on his day-to-day work as a Member of Parliament.

Mr Morgan also visited the school as part of the Vote 100 campaign celebrating the centenary of votes for women. In addition to the plastics campaign, Mr Morgan celebrated equality with an 'Equalitea' afternoon tea – to mark 100 years since the 1918 Representation of the People Act.



#### Natalie Sheppard, Principal of The Portsmouth Academy, said:

I am so proud of the fantastic initiative shown by our pupils on this critical issue – they have single-handedly united the school behind their drive to reduce plastics.

Their inspiring efforts demonstrate what we tell our pupils every day - that every young person has the power to effect change. I cannot wait to see what they will go on to achieve next.

A third of students achieved an outstanding 39 points or more (eight points above the world average and equivalent to gaining four A\*s at A level), and the majority of students won a place at their first-choice university, including Oxford, UCL, Imperial, Warwick and Durham.

#### Stand-out results included:

- Two students who will go to Oxford: Philippa Lang will read Linguistics at Oxford University after achieving 42 points and Anna Sharpe will read History at Oxford University after scoring 40 points
- Louisa Bodman, who scored 40 points and secured a highly sought-after apprenticeship with top accountancy firm Ernst and Young
- Kelsey Killick, who achieved 43 points, a score of 43 means Kelsey has numerous options and she is deciding which university at which to study psychology
- Abigail Page, who achieved 43 points, will now go on to study Anthropology at UCL

The IB, which this year marks its 50th birthday, is studied in the Sixth Form as an alternative to A levels, and has been offered at RGS for the last 11 years. Students must take six subjects, incorporating both sciences and humanities.

The glowing report follows the school's recent academic success. In the Government's secondary school league tables released in January, Holcombe Grammar School was ranked in the top 12% of schools nationally, achieving a Progress 8 score of 0.48 – which means its students achieve nearly half a GCSE grade better per subject than pupils of a similar ability nationally. Overall, 96% of students achieved the pass grade of Level 4 or above in English and Maths GCSE last year.

Parental engagement is one of the fundamental keys to sustaining and improving child wellbeing at and away from school and New Horizons has shown prowess in their commitment to work with parents.


