


### TSAT's \* GOLDEN TICKETS

### Goodwin students rejoice as they graduate from the Scholars **Programme**

At the beginning of the year, a selection of students from Goodwin Academy enrolled on to the Brilliant Club's Scholars Programme. This course is designed to "help students develop the knowledge, skills, and confidence to progress to the most competitive universities". (The Brilliant Club, 2023)

The programme helps students gain skills in critical thinking and written communication and improves their subject knowledge in a number of areas. According to the UCAS Evaluation in 2021, "Year 12 students who complete The Scholars Programme are statistically significantly more likely to apply and progress to a competitive university than students from similar backgrounds."

Over the months our students have been studying challenging courses on subjects that



look beyond the standard curriculum. These subjects are taught by PhD tutors, giving the students a taste of universitystyle learning, and involved researching and answering questions like "Germline gene editing is real. How did humanity

get to this point?" With this particular session, the students explored scientific discoveries, including CRISPR-CAS9 and Artificial

Reproductive Technology (ART), and gained an understanding of the changes in the landscape of bioethical discussion.

On top of the classes, our students enjoyed the opportunity to visit Goldsmiths University of London in October to attend a study skills session and an information, advice and quidance session from the university, as well as taking in a campus tour and meeting current students to learn more about student life in higher education. It was amazing to hear them come away from this trip feeling very inspired and motivated to succeed.



This is Goodwin's second year running this programme; the first cohort completed the programme based on "Symmetry, Symmetry Breaking, and Why the Universe Doesn't Annihilate Itself" with PhD tutor Lauren Martin in early 2022. Following the success of last year's students, we are thrilled that 100% of this year's group passed the programme with flying colours.

On Wednesday 8th February 2023, our students enjoyed a celebratory breakfast at school with their Headteacher, Mrs Moon, before travelling to London where they officially graduated at the Imperial College London.

Well done to everyone involved for this brilliant achievement!











## Holcombe students start their Young Reporter Course with gusto!

Four Year 12 students from Holcombe Grammar School in Chatham have enrolled on to the Young Reporter scheme, run by an external provider, News Shopper.

The Young Reporter Scheme is open to students in Years 10 to 13 and runs from January through to April. During this time our budding reporters are treated like real journalists, being given deadlines to work to and guidelines categories to write within, writing four articles overall. The articles are then published on the News Shopper website, where our students' work can be read by a monthly audience of up to 39 million subscribers.



Mentored by Miss Bloomfield, our students were tasked with their first assignment, which saw the aspiring journalists being sent into the local community to find their first news article to write about. These have now been published for everyone to see.

The Young Reporter Scheme enables our students to learn valuable skills that they can take beyond the school day and use in the modern world. What's more, the course, once completed, is a great addition to our students' UCAS applications or CVs.



Hundreds of children from three school communities dreamt big for Aspirations Day by dressing up and inviting parents and carers into the school to share stories about their job.

The national awareness week is designed to broaden children's understanding of the variety of careers they can aspire to have. It encourages individuals to discover the different job roles available across all different industries.



## Brixham College holds science spectacular for hundreds of Torbay school children

Hundreds of children from across Torbay had a day of mesmerising experiments following a science spectacular at Brixham College.

More than 600 children enjoyed the two-day Wonderstruck science show earlier this year and left amazed and inspired about the wonders of physics and chemistry.

The event saw ear-splitting explosions, fire-fuelled bangs, gunpowder, flames and smoke, a 10ft fireball, rocket building sessions, mind expanding science facts, and a demo of a working jet engine within the workshops.

Local primary schools that attended the event, which was supported by the Thinking Schools Academy Trust, included Furzeham Primary School and Nursery, Eden Park Primary School, Roselands Primary School, White Rock Primary School, Brixham Church of England School, St Margaret Clitherow Catholic Primary School, Collaton St Mary Primary School, and Galmpton Church of England Primary School.

The event also presented the opportunity to showcase other STEM subjects and

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make them relevant, fun and exciting for all ages.

Mark Eager, Principal at Brixham College, said it was brilliant to bring schools from across Torbay together. He said: "We are incredibly proud to deliver an education that challenges, inspires and excites our students so, welcoming Peter from Wonderstruck back to contribute towards this, was an absolute pleasure. We were delighted to have the opportunity to invite our community of primary schools to join us."

One of the workshops on the day saw children build their own rocket, which was powered by compressed air. They use the same basic principles that send people to the moon, but use the power of air squeezed into a small space instead of a combustion reaction.



Peter Wright, of Wonderstruck, praised Brixham's warm welcome and said it was good to be back. He said: "It's always great to come back to Brixham. We're quaranteed enthusiastic audiences and a really enjoyable event. It's certainly one that we look forward to. Any event where we get a chance to engage with young people and inspire them to think about the wonder of science and how amazing the universe around us is worthwhile. The world is facing a lot of challenges at the moment and empowering young people to understand and help to meet those challenges is key to what we do."

Mandy Gage, Director of Education at the Thinking Schools Academy Trust for Torbay, praised the team who led the event, saying: "It has been wonderful to see Brixham College holding an event for other schools within the community. At the Thinking Schools Academy Trust, we're all about transforming life chances of children and young people by inspiring them through many different ways. This Wonderstruck event is a perfect example of our passion to give pupils something to remember and learn from."

Tom Norman, who is a teacher of Physics but also leads Computer Science at the college, said: "At Brixham College, we are passionate about Science and our community. That's why we hold the amazing Wonderstruck event to give Year 5 students the opportunity to be wowed by science. Our hope is to ignite a lifelong love of asking questions about the world we live in and to build on the enthusiasm young people have to learn more about the universe.

"One of the highlights of the event is when young people can become rocket scientists for the day. Not only is this a great opportunity for our primary school students to learn outside of the classroom, our Year 7 students engaged with the activities too. After all, it is the experiences we have at school that

we remember with fondness, hopefully everybody who has seen Wonderstruck over the last two days will never forget it."

All Thinking Fitness gyms launched successful January campaigns and we are delighted to have welcomed so many new members across our four sites. ## Construction begins on Maritime Academy in Frindsbury



Thinking Schools Academy Trust were delighted to be part of the official ground-breaking ceremony to celebrate the start of the building work on the much-anticipated Maritime Academy in Frindsbury.

Maritime Academy opened to students in September 2022, temporarily located in Twydall, with the new purpose-built site in Frindsbury due to open in Summer 2024. Maritime is helping to address the shortfall of secondary school places in Medway and will have the capacity to offer 1,150 student places to the community.

The ground-breaking ceremony was attended by a number of representatives from across the community. These included representatives from the Department for Education, Medway Councillor Martin Potter, the CEO of Thinking Schools Academy Trust, Stuart Gardner, the Director of Education for the Strood Hub, Jody Murphy, Head of School at Maritime Academy, Matt Evans, Board Member, Ashley Hall, Governor, Peter Martin with Chair of Governors, Gerard Newman.



Once completed, the new building will boast a range of exceptional and modern facilities, delivering on the Academy's ethos of 'making excellence a habit' and its mission to provide a first-class education where every young person in our community deserves to have the best opportunities at life regardless of their individual circumstances.

The Maritime Academy's permanent site will be a home to state-of-the-art learning environment including a brand-new Thinking Fitness gym, open for students during the day and members of the public in the evenings, at weekends and during school holidays. All profits generated by Thinking Fitness memberships will be recycled back into the Trust to support its mission of 'transforming life chances'.



The construction, overseen by Bowmer + Kirkland, will deliver a carbon-neutral build. The Academy will house sustainable features such as LED lights, eco-friendly temperature control in the classrooms, electronic car charging points, bike racks, and recycling stations and will use responsibly sourced materials. The Academy's student drive team of Engineering Officers are involved with the building's sustainability planning and have been working on sustainability projects within their 'Horizon' enrichment periods, in their science lessons and via their community lunch topical discussions.



Jody Murphy, Director of Education for the Strood Hub, said:

"We have worked exceptionally hard to design an academy that supports our mission to offer a unique opportunity for students to learn in a modern setting with traditional values. Our new academy has been designed with our students and the wider environment in mind. To see work begin on this today is incredibly exciting for our staff, students and community. I cannot wait for our students and their education to benefit from such excellent facilities."

Stuart Gardner, CEO of Thinking Schools Academy Trust, said:

"We are pleased to see groundwork begin on site as it marks an exciting moment in the Academy's history. We are working closely with our partners from Bowmer + Kirkland, the Department for Education and Medway Council to build these new school facilities that will help not only provide much-needed school spaces in the region but ensure a high standard of learning for all."

Anna Webb, Headteacher at Penbridge School in Lincoln Road, Fratton, says the opening of the new play area is thanks to many hours of hard work and planning.



She said: "We have had a desire to positively transform this playground for some time now and the day has finally arrived. It has been lovely to welcome our special guests to come and officially open the playground.

"Some of our children don't have outdoor spaces to explore at home, so this will make a significant difference to the adventure they will experience every day at Penbridge."

This is an exceptional achievement for the students and the first step toward the National Final, which takes place at the Old Bailey later this year.

### Making learning last through digital transformation reveals positive response from schools

Since introducing one:one devices within primary and secondary schools across the Thinking Schools Academy Trust, lessons have unsurprisingly evolved and engagement amongst students has increased too.

By implementing laptops into the classroom and offering some students with the opportunity to own their own device, our Trust is playing a critical role in closing the digital divide and providing children and young people with the essential digital skills they need to thrive in the future.

Most importantly, our one:one programme is all about 'Making Learning Last', and we're seeing exactly that in all the settings with devices.

At The Portsmouth Academy, they are approaching the end of their second full year of using one:one devices within the school. Currently, they have Year 7 and Year 8 pupils benefiting from the innovative scheme and have been recognised by Microsoft as a Showcase School – the only one within the Trust with this prestigious mark.

The Hampshire-based Academy has big plans for the future of its one:one scheme, so we caught up with Karla Barnes, Digital Learning Ambassador at The Portsmouth Academy, to hear all about what she thinks of one:one.

"The devices put everyone on a level playing field" she said, "People shouldn't feel disadvantaged because they don't have access to technology, when technology is going to be in every job they have when they leave school. At The Portsmouth Academy, we talk about future-ready skills which are incredibly important."

In a recent survey, 96% of students using their HP Probook x360 have confidence using their device, while 92% of students believe the devices have improved their learning.

Miss Barnes acknowledged everyone has different learning styles and these computers are accommodating peoples' preferences to absorbing important information.

She said: "There are so many different learning styles and the children can use their devices in such a way that works for them. This has made all the difference; there's not just one learning style when using these devices, you can tailor the style very much to the individual and that helps the students learn."



As a result of these devices, the average reading progress score for Year 7 students increased by 13 months, while it was 10 months for those in Year 8.

Karla continued: "I'm really pleased with how things are developing around one:one devices at The Portsmouth Academy. Since being awarded our Microsoft Showcase School accreditation, it does feel that we are more unified in our approach to delivering technological education. I know there's Google Classroom, but with Microsoft everyone is confident about its benefits. It feels familiar – even if people don't know something about the system – using and working with Microsoft is like a warm hug so I'm excited for the future."

Elsewhere within the Thinking Schools
Academy Trust, Maritime Academy in Kent
embraced the one:one way of teaching and
learning when they opened in September
2022. As a new school, they have an exciting
window of opportunity to interact and engage
with the devices that's new for all.

They have approached one:one as an investment in the future of education, and as an initiative that is the start of a new and exciting era for the Maritime Academy.



Mr Jimmy Carr, Assistant Principal at Maritime Academy and lead for the one:one Scheme at the school says "We believe one:one devices in our lessons will give students access to the latest technology to support their learning, in preparation for the next steps in their lives after education and promote our ethos of academic excellence."

Maritime Academy have Year 7 students using their Microsoft Surface SE devices. Through the effective use of technology, the school believe that learning is not just something that happens within the classroom – it is something that transcends the uniform and the text book and stays with students once they have left school.



Jimmy explains that "Technology is an influential part of young people's lives and we want to support students to become digitally literate and support their development to become good digital citizens. The Maritime Academy will use one:one devices to assist with our Maritime '5' Waves of Learning so each classroom has a consistent approach to enable academic excellence to flourish."

He continues to say "From day one of Year 7, students at the Maritime Academy will all receive a one:one device, so that they can benefit from a curriculum that has been developed with digital learning at its core. Learning with one:one devices is about investing in the right equipment, using modern learning techniques, offering a blended approach, teaching vital skills and trusting students to work and learn independently."



The students have taken to working digitally extremely well. Lola, one of the founding Year 7 students at Maritime reflects "It is so much easier using a device than writing all the answers and sticking sheets of paper into my book and it helps me to look back at the work we have recently completed to support me with my next projects and assignments." Fellow Year 7 Franklin describes the pride they have in being given the responsibility to look after the device, while Aaryan says "I really like using my one:one device because when I use Carousel, I can look at my previous answers. If I was wrong, we would discuss it and get to the right answer so next time I will get the answer correct."

# Furzeham Primary & Nursery School is recognised for English and Maths excellence in final year of national award



Children from Furzeham Primary School and Nursery have been celebrating excellence in their English and mathematics provision after being re-accredited by a national organisation by receiving the Quality Mark.

The Quality Mark aims to focus educational organisations to undertake effective self-evaluation and continuous improvement for English and mathematics, which drives better outcomes for pupils, their families and society.

the school, says it's
great for the school

providing a strong English
and mathematics provision to the
children.

She said: "It's fantastic that Furzeham has once again been acknowledged for having a strong depth of knowledge and understanding of school strengths around our English and mathematics provision.

"As a Senior Leadership Team, we have worked with children and pupils, all staff and leaders to develop what we think is a very strong base of basic skills of all areas of our curriculum.

"The Quality Mark has recognised us as passionate about providing opportunities to improve for all, with very high expectations for all pupils."

The Quality Mark Framework has been developed in consultation with local councils, academy trusts, practitioners and educational experts with a focus on promoting and celebrating improved and strong English and mathematics.

Debbie Hewitt, who leads
English at the school, says
the main focus hasn't
been developing the
curriculum of specific
topics, but all areas of
learning.

She said: "Over the last 18 months, we have had a main focus across the school of developing a whole school reading culture and ensuring that reading is at the centre of our curriculum.

"As part of that process and journey we have been developing a whole class reading approach, ensuring the explicit teaching of vocabulary, fluency and comprehension skills and also the opportunity for the children to apply those skills in different activities.

"We were absolutely thrilled when the basic skills Quality Mark made that a key strength of our award and accreditation." Despite the school being accredited for its Quality Mark for another year, this will be the last accreditation as the scheme is coming to a close after more

than 25 years.

The news comes due to the rise in popularity of multi academy trusts and collaboration and partnerships between schools focusing on improvements from within, deeming the award less important.

Genna Chapman, who oversees the mathematics provision at the school, said: "Our focus at Furzeham is to equip children with a solid mathematical understanding of place, value and number. It is fundamental that children have both the conceptual and procedural understanding of "The use of manipulatives for children to have a concrete understanding is so key and so models, images, and

> representations are considered and used throughout all the year groups in the school. This consistency and

progression have been noted by the Quality

Mark."

## New Horizons Children's Academy Arts Awards



The Victory Academy rejoices as 63 of their Year 8 students receive their Arts Award Bronze qualification!

The Arts Award is a set of arts-related qualifications that can be earned by all children and young people under the age of 25. It is run by Trinity College London and Arts Council England. The awards offer five levels of qualifications: Discover, Explore, Bronze, Silver, and Gold, and can be awarded for any art form, from music to mime, painting to pottery and dancing to drawing.

To gain the Bronze Award, students had to actively participate in an art form of their choice, experience at least one arts event and review it, research the career and work of

an artist or craftsperson of their choice, and pass on an art skill. This Level 1 qualification is designed for young people aged 11 to 14 and typically takes 60 hours to complete. It got students involved in the arts as both creators and audience members, and it encouraged them to start their paths to becoming leaders by teaching others what they had learned.



We have a strong focus on the arts across our Trust, with a number of our schools gaining Artsmark Awards at varying levels. The Victory Academy is proud to be an Artsmark Platinum School, dedicated to cultural entitlement and opportunity for all young people, particularly those who are at a disadvantage.

New Horizons Children's Academy in Chatham is also on their Art Awards journey. In January, children in the school took part in a number of creative activities as part of their Arts Day, with students in Year 1 completing their Arts Award Discover Award and Year 5 completing their Arts Award Explore Award.

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The Discover Award is designed for children aged 5 and above, encouraging them to explore the arts all around them, research different artists, and develop their knowledge and understanding of the arts. It inspires children's creativity, curiosity and confidence, boosting their communication skills through discussing their discoveries with their peers. During Arts Day, Year 1 students identified a wide variety of art forms by going on a discovery walk around the school building and conducting their own research. Following this, the children explored the alternative art form of 'marbling' and learned about the work and significance of Yayoi Kusama, creating their own artwork inspired by the style of this artist.

The goal of the Explore Award is to get children interested in different kinds of art and artists and to help them find their own style and creativity. Year 5 experimented with 'wax resistant' art and 'charcoal sketching'. These are alternative art forms outside of what is offered in the national curriculum. The students researched the artist Keith Haring and created their own artwork inspired by the style of this artist. The students then used their knowledge and understanding gained throughout the qualification to create a final piece of art.

Following the hard work from Arts Day in January, the children's work has been assessed by Trinity College London, and we are proud to share that all students in Years 1 and 5 passed their levels and achieved their Art Award qualifications.

This means that 100% of students at New Horizons Children's Academy in Years 1–6 have achieved the Discover certificate, and 100% of students in Years 5–6 have completed the Explore certificate.







### Young Voices 1 6 9:

Music enthusiasts from across the Thinking Schools Academy Trust enjoyed an experience of a lifetime by attending two events that bring children together to create the largest youth choir in the world.

Pupils at Furzeham Primary & Nursery School in Devon attended Young Voices 2023 at the Resorts World Arena in Birmingham earlier this year, while young singers from Cedar Children's Academy, The Gordon Children's Academy, All Faiths Children's Academy and New Horizons Children's Academy joined thousands of others at the O2 Arena in London.

Young Voices aims to bring teachers and their students together to provide an educational and live performance experience everyone will remember for the rest of their lives.

Celebrities at the Birmingham event which Furzeham attended included Heather Small from dance band M People, The Beatbox Collective, and Tony Hadley.

Polly Booth, one of the teachers at Furzeham who attended the event, said: "For the staff attending the event, it's wonderful to see the children with smiles on their faces while they are singing. It's something that stays with you and you will never forget, it's a truly incredible experience."



Young Voices has staged full-scale arena concerts with first-class production value across the nation for more than 25 years. Since launching, hundreds of children from across the Trust have enjoyed their events with more than two million passing through the doors of their shows.

Collectively, children from four of our Kentbased schools joined roughly 20,000 children at the singing and dancing event that captivates young minds at the O2 Arena in London.

Even though some schools from our Trust across Devon and Kent came together for two separate Young Voices events, they were unified in the songs and dances they shared.

Each school is sent a pack ahead of their afternoon in the spotlight to support children and staff with learning the words and dances to the songs.

Xavier-Cope, of New Horizons Children's Academy, believes attending this experience is not only an unforgettable journey for children, but an unforgettable memory parents will hear all about.

They said: "The concert started at 7pm and we got to sing our hearts out and we even got to sing with Heather Small! We were all having

a wonderful time and it was great to see the children enjoying themselves."

Young Voices strive to introduce music to children that might be new to them but spark a sense of nostalgia for the parents.

#### Celebrations all round for Thinking School Accreditations

There's a lot to celebrate at the Thinking Schools Academy Trust during the last few months with four of our schools having been awarded levels of Thinking School status by the University of Exeter. Congratulations to New Horizons Primary School in Portsmouth for achieving Level 1 Thinking School recognition and to Holcombe Grammar School, The Rochester Grammar School, and Penbridge Junior School for being awarded Advanced Thinking School status.

The Trust takes pride in its unique and effective approach to learning and education. Students are provided with the skillset and tools they need to think in a variety of ways and become lifelong learners. These transferable Thinking Tools prepare young people for a range of situations, dilemmas and circumstances that they may face later in life as part of modern society.

Thinking Schools at Exeter leads the way in research in Metacognition, Thinking Skills, Creativity and Dialogue in Education - providing a structure for schools to become recognised Thinking Schools. All four schools have worked hard to weave this framework into everyday life at their schools and this was recognised with New Horizons Primary being awarded their Level 1.

To achieve Level 2 Thinking accreditation to become an Advanced Thinking School, the academies were assessed on; Dissemination of Practice, Evaluative Research, Professional Development, Differentiation, and Whole School Assessment. These areas identify the school's continued work to support lifelong learning and holistic growth for all students. Holcombe Grammar School started their Thinking Journey back in 2019, when they were awarded Level 1, Thinking School status, and have since continued to build



on their practices to gain Level 2 as have Penbridge Junior School who were accredited as an Advanced Thinking School in October 2019. Whereas, The Rochester Grammar School has a "long history of Thinking School development and accreditation and has been at the core of the Thinking School movement for many years".

All four schools have fully embedded Thinking Skills into their teaching, assessment, evaluation, and staff development which was recognised throughout the reports. The University of Exeter documented, "[Rochester Grammar's] cognitive education development journey has moved forward unswervingly since its previous accreditation [...] The school has embedded thinking and meta-cognitive approaches in all aspects of school life in order to ensure that its aims and ethos are a reality."

Holcombe has developed their work with the Thinking Skills to progress up to a Level 2 Thinking School, with the report explaining "Thinking Skills are fully embedded in the culture of the school such that Holcombe is a collaborative educational community. The dissemination of best practice across the school and beyond positions [the school] as a beacon of metacognitive excellence where best practice is nurtured so that children develop as holistic lifelong learners. The focus on the professional growth of staff is exceptional."



Principal of Holcombe Grammar School, Lee Preston, says "The staff at Holcombe work tirelessly to transform the life chances of our students, support their progress and develop their thinking. I couldn't be prouder that the University of Exeter's School of Education recognises the commitment we have for our young people and awarded us the Advanced Thinking School accreditation. Thank you to everyone involved who worked so hard to achieve this award."

Both grammars have been praised for their high aspiration and achievement for students, with the Thinking Schools at Exeter report stating "What sets Holcombe aside from many schools, is its emphasis on how this is achieved. [...] the school seeks to make learning active by developing children as creative, adaptable, and resilient thinkers so that they become committed lifelong learners." The report was extremely complimentary toward Rochester Grammar's continued deliverance of excellence explaining that "[Rochester Grammar] is clearly a school that prides itself in achieving and maintaining the highest educational standards [...] it is a school where every individual is encouraged to achieve excellence and this is captured well in its ethos statements: 'Excellence for All', 'Raising Aspirations', 'Delivering Excellence', and 'Transforming Life Chances'."

Clare Brinklow, Principal of The Rochester Grammar School, says "We could not be prouder to be reaccredited as an Advanced Thinking School. #### Let's talk about

Speaking about our troubles can be difficult for anybody. Men don't always feel comfortable to open up about life's challenges and their mental health.

If you know someone who may be going through a tough time, try reaching out with **ALEC**.

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Start by <u>asking</u> how he's feeling. It's worth mentioning any changes you've picked up on. Maybe he's spending more time at the bar, has gone quiet in the group chat, or isn't turning up to social events. Whatever it is, he's just not himself.

Use a prompt like, "You haven't seemed yourself lately – are you feeling OK?"

Give him your full attention. Let him know you're hearing what he's saying and you're not judging. You don't have to diagnose problems or offer solutions, but asking questions lets him know you're <u>listening</u>.

Ask a question like, "That can't be easy – how long have you felt this way?"



Help him focus on simple things that might improve how he feels. Is he getting enough sleep? Is he exercising and eating well? Maybe there's something that has helped him in the past - it's worth asking.


Suggest that he share how he's feeling with others he trusts. This will make things easier for both of you. And if he has felt low for more than two weeks, <u>encourage</u> him to chat to his doctor.



Suggest you catch up soon - <u>check-in</u> in person if you can. If you can't manage a meet-up, make time for a call, or drop him a message. This helps to show that you care; plus, you'll get a feel for whether he's feeling any better.









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
