Maritime Academy New Build Success

Maritime Academy sail-abrates official opening of new school building in Frindsbury

Maritime Academy, a new secondary school in Frindsbury, hosted its official opening event on Thursday 19th September, launching its impressive new school building.

The school was built to meet the increasing need for secondary school places in the region. The new space, which is now home to students in Years 7, 8 and 9, will eventually serve 1,100 young people, providing a high-tech and supportive learning environment.

The opening event welcomed more than 60 attendees who have been part of the school's journey and provided support throughout the process. Attendees included Councillor Vince Maple, Leader of Medway Council, Councillor Tracy Coombs, Portfolio Holder for Education at Medway Council, the contractors and architects involved in the build, as well as key members of the Thinking Schools Academy Trust.

Guests were greeted at the school before being regaled with speeches from Stuart Gardner, the Trust's CEO, Gerard Newman, Chair of the Board, Matt Evans, Maritime Academy Principal, and students. The blue ribbon was cut marking the official opening of the site, commemorated by a plaque displayed in the Galley area.

Tours of the building then commenced, allowing attendees to explore the facilities of this new site, designed with the students and the environment in mind. The three-story building boasts incredible state-of-the-art facilities including a spacious main hall, fittingly named the Quarterdeck with a separate drama space, Design and Food Technology labs, and modern classrooms with ample amounts of natural light as well as recycling stations and electric charging points.

The grounds also have a brand-new gym centre for students to use as part of their sports education. Part of the Trust's not-for-profit Thinking Fitness brand, the gym will also be open to the local community outside of school hours, offering a well-equipped and friendly space for people to exercise while putting money back into the education of the local students.

The school has also been keen to open its doors for students and families to explore their













new home ahead of the Year 6 open evening on Tuesday 24th September. With this in mind, current students were invited to enjoy tours with their families, giving them an opportunity to see the school they are proud to send their children to.

The event rounded off with mingling and canapés, prepared by the school's catering team.

The opening event was a very special moment for the school, which originally opened its doors at a temporary location in September 2022 due to the discovery of some of the largest prehistoric stone tools in Britain on the building site.

Archaeologists uncovered a giant hand axe thought to be over 300,000 years old and a Roman cemetery, discoveries of both regional and national significance. The school is proud to be part of Medway and the rich history the area holds and has integrated this historical discovery into its curriculum so students can

explore the heritage of Frindsbury and beyond.

Matt Evans, Principal of Maritime Academy reflected on the events, saying: "I'm so proud to say we have officially opened Maritime Academy. It's been a long journey for the school, but with the support of our Trust, community and of course our students, we are finally here.

"The new building offers everything a student could want for their education, with state-ofthe-art facilities and spacious grounds, I look forward to seeing our young people grow throughout their years with us."

Paignton Fitness Hoops **Grant Success**

Paignton Sports Hub celebrate much anticipated restoration of community basketball hoops

In a heartening victory for local sports enthusiasts, Paignton Sports Hub has successfully restored its basket hoops, thanks to a grant from Active Devon.

Paignton Sports Hub on Waterleat Road provides Paignton Academy students and the wider community with 16 courts for badminton, basketball, netball, football and gymnastics.

It is the only multi-court site available in Torbay for hosting both junior and adult basketball tournaments throughout the year, playing a vital role in nurturing athletic talent and fostering community spirit.

Given its regular use by more than 1,400 students and 1,000 residents, Thinking Lettings applied for funding to update the facilities. They were successful and received a generous £15,000 grant from Active Devon to help bring new life to the beloved centre.

At the forefront of this renovation was the restoration of the very popular basketball hoops which are used by many students and community clubs across the region. The repairs have been successful and the basketball hoops now stand tall and fully functional, ready to welcome players of all ages.

Cody Levell, Fitness and Lettings Manager at Paignton Hub has expressed: "Active Devon is dedicated to inspiring and supporting the people of Devon to be active and we would like to thank them for their funding. The grant will support basketball as a provision both for the students at Paignton Academy and the clubs and community across Torbay.

Holcombe Grammar School is thrilled to maintain its 'Good' school status, following its Ofsted Inspection

The highly complementary report highlighted the school's dedication to creating a learning community where life chances can be transformed, commenting that "the school's motto of 'Transforming Life Chances' is reflected in all that the school does."

The inspectors praised the school's ambition for its pupils, the importance placed on ensuring a high-quality curriculum and the purposeful atmosphere in lessons. Furthermore, Ofsted commended the strength of personal development at Holcombe, applauding the wealth of opportunities provided to nurture pupils' talents and interests and support them to progress onto successful careers.

Other highlights included:

- Teachers are real experts and weave subject-specific and technical vocabulary skilfully into conversations that they have with pupils
- Pupils benefit from studying a wide range of subjects
- Teaching staff receive the training they need to help pupils and as a result, pupils with SEND access the same curriculum as their peers and achieve well overall
- Safeguarding is effective and pupils know who to turn to if they are worried about anything
- The new personal development curriculum is delivered enthusiastically by staff and is valued by pupils. They learn how to be responsible citizens and develop healthy relationships

- High numbers participate in the Duke of Edinburgh Award school or join Sea Cadets and the school's arts, drama and music clubs thrive
- Pupils in Sixth Form value the guidance they are given for their next steps. They feel well informed about university courses, apprenticeships and employment and that consequently many go on to top universities and high-profile careers

Lee Preston, Headteacher of Holcombe Grammar School, reflected: "I am delighted to see that Ofsted recognises the hard work all of our staff put into ensuring that we provide a rich and inspiring education for our pupils. We nurture our pupils to become lifelong learners so they can continue to grow as they step out into the world beyond school, and it is wonderful to see the report reflect this. Making a Splash

Children make a splash and learn about water safety as pop-up pool comes to Portsmouth

Hundreds of children across three of our Portsmouth schools enjoyed making a splash in a temportary swimming pool that opened in the summer term, the first of its kind to open at a school in the city.

Meon Way Federation dived into the future of primary school swimming by having a popup solution to teach children to swim. It was based on the Moorings Way Infant School site.

The opportunities to use the pool were offered to children at Meon Infant School, Moorings Way Infant School, and Meon Junior School, who collectively form Meon Way Federation.

The innovative programme, led by Swim:ED and supported by ActiveMe 360, has a mission to improve pupils' swimming proficiency and water safety skills.

Swim:ED was developed by education specialists with experience delivering physical education, sport, and physical activities for pupils within primary schools across the country.

The innovative pop-up pool initiative aims to revolutionise swimming education in schools, allowing more young people to benefit from regular swim sessions.

Sara Paine, Executive Headteacher at Meon Way Federation, says the pool was a hit with children, saying: "Welcoming Swim:Ed to Meon Way Federation has been a long time in the making, but I am delighted to see hundreds of our children enjoying the pop-up pool to strengthen their swimming ability and learning more about being safe around water.

"Our aspiration is for all pupils who attend the Federation to be able to swim and know water safety skills. Already, we are looking at dates for the future."

Will Atterbury, Founder and Managing Director at ActiveMe 360 CIC who managed the pool at Moorings Way said: "Following our success in other areas of Hampshire we are delighted to be able to bring the popup pool programme, Swim:ED, to the City of Portsmouth. This is our most exciting venture yet in our mission to change lives and improve health and wellbeing for children in Hampshire and Sussex.

"Swimming is a crucial life skill, especially in a coastal region where we are reminded all too often of the dangers of different waters around us, and it can also have such a positive impact on people's wellbeing."

Since joining the Thinking Schools Academy Trust in September 2023, Lodestar Academy continues to improve. Here is what their Headteacher, Steven Hume, has to say when he spoke to Our Trust about his experience

Describe life at Lodestar Academy before joining Thinking Schools Academy Trust (TSAT)? Before joining TSAT, Lodestar, previously known as Burton Academy, was part of another trust and went through a challenging period. We had to be moved to a different trust. At that time, we were graded as requiring improvement by Ofsted, and we struggled to progress further on our own. Being a small school in a relatively remote area, we needed the support of a large, effective trust to move forward.

Why did you choose Thinking Schools Academy Trust? Initially, the Department for Education suggested another trust specialising in special schools for children with learning difficulties, but we felt a mainstream or mixed trust would better suit our needs. We wanted a trust that viewed our students as part of the mainstream community. We were impressed by TSAT's values and vision.

How was your experience when onboarding with TSAT? The onboarding process was exceptional. TSAT started working with us as soon as we were approved to join, months before the official transition. This proactive approach made us feel part of the TSAT family early on. Teams from TSAT visited us to understand our needs and offer support. Their genuine interest and balanced approach made us feel valued and excited about the collaboration.

How did TSAT support your journey to becoming a good school? TSAT's support was crucial in our journey to achieving a good rating from Ofsted. TSAT provided us with a clear pedagogy, improved governance, and significant curriculum development support. They paired us with the Rowans Alternative Provision in Kent, an outstanding school that isn't even a member of our trust, to help us develop our curriculum. This collaboration, along with TSAT's ongoing support, accelerated our improvement significantly.

What three words would you use to describe your experience with TSAT so far? Collaborative, supportive, transformative.

150 Years of Education

Plymouth High community takes a trip down memory lane

Past and present students and staff of Plymouth High School for Girls came together for a celebration event to mark 150 years of service to the community.

Throughout 2024, the school has been commemorating 150 years since it opened as a cornerstone of education for girls across the region.

Plymouth High was founded as a consequence of the growing pressure in the late 19th century to improve women's rights and encourage girls to be ambitious, welcomed hundreds of people through its doors earlier this month for an afternoon talk, high tea, tour of classrooms and a chance to enjoy the specially created archive room.

Months of preparation went into the packed event earlier in the summer, with a student and staff team formed to work collaboratively with a group of our Alumni, to make the 150th celebrations and event to foster reflection and also look to the future with optimism. It achieved exactly that.

The event also welcomed two former Headmistresses Mrs Rosemary Stoggall (1991 to 1998) and Mrs Sue Martin (1999 to 2007), who were welcomed onto the stage to offer reflections of their time leading the school. Laughter filled the air throughout their reflective moments, with the event concluding with a rendition of the school's original song.

Simon Underdown, Headteacher at Plymouth High School for Girls, praised the success of the event, saying: "It has been a wonderful occasion to bring members of this school community, old and new, together for this momentous achievement of educating girls (and latterly boys in the Sixth Form) across our region for 150 years.

"At Plymouth High, our motto 'For Life, Not School, We Learn' is the firm foundation of everything we do and it has been fantastic

to see former students inspiring our existing pupils to live by that every day. In particular, it was a joy to welcome back two former headmistresses and hear their memories of Plymouth High. Our student leaders did a superb job of hosting and welcoming everyone to the event."

Heather Morgan, a former pupil at the school who joined in 1971, said: "It has been wonderful walking down memory lane looking at the archives, finding photographs of ourselves and our yearbook and, most of all, I enjoyed talking to current students. It

has been quite emotional to walk through the corridors and see the classrooms. We loved our time at school, and while some things look a little different there is also so much that is still the same, so it triggers those lovely memories of the times we had at school, we just loved being back here to enjoy this day.'

Paula Roberts, who also attended the school from 1971, said: "Today, we have been talking to the students and they have been asking us questions, and we have been asking them questions, and it's really interesting to see how alike everything is, despite it being a very long time since we were at school. Nothing has really changed, and I think that is the beauty of Plymouth High School."

New Developments at The Victory Academy



The Victory Academy lays the groundwork for new developments

The Victory Academy, in partnership with Medway Council, laid out plans and designs for a Specialist Resource Provision (SRP) and new Sixth Form block at the school. The academy consulted with their local community to provide feedback on their development plan to expand the school, and following a positive response for both, the school broke ground for the build in Term 5.

The SRP will help students requiring additional support for Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH). This provision will be housed in a new capital build project which will be completed in late 2024. Initially, the provision will provide spaces for a small number of students with an Education and Healthcare Plan (EHCP), expanding to accommodate a

'The school will receive additional funding to meet the students' needs through additional support, resources, and specialist training' maximum of 25 students over time. All students attending the SRP will have an EHCP that lists SEMH as their primary need.

The Victory Academy and Thinking Schools Academy Trust have a fully inclusive ethos. As a result, the SRP will be of tremendous value to the community and the school. The school will receive additional funding to meet the students' needs through additional support, resources, and specialist training.

In addition, the new Sixth Form block will provide state-of-the-art facilities for the school's growing Sixth Form, including study and social spaces specifically for Sixth Form students, which will be separate from the main Academy building. This will support an increase in the school's Published Admission Number (PAN) from 210 to 240 students in Year 7 from either September 2025 or September 2026, providing additional teaching space within the main building.

Existing Sixth Form space will be converted into additional classrooms. This increase in PAN will further help to meet the increased need for secondary school places in Medway.





Thinking School Accreditation Award

Furzeham Primary and Nursery School Awarded Thinking School Accreditation by The University of Exeter

Furzeham Primary and Nursery School has been awarded Thinking School accreditation by the University of Exeter, joining 17 other schools across the Thinking Schools Academy Trust to gain Thinking School status.

Furzeham Primary and Nursery School joined the Thinking Schools Academy Trust in November 2022 and soon after began its journey towards a Thinking School status. In May 2024, the school hosted a 'Celebration of Learning' event, which highlighted its commitment to embedding thinking tools such as Habits of Mind, Thinking Hats, Thinking Maps, and Thinking Keys.

One of the highlights of the event was the introduction of their 'Mini Thinkers Drive Team', a group of pupils from Year 2 to Year 6, dedicated to promoting the 16 Habits of Mind and enhancing their critical thinking, creativity, and problem-solving skills.

Furzeham Primary and Nursery School has worked hard to weave this framework into everyday life at the school, and this was recognised throughout the school's assessment and subsequent accreditation.

The University of Exeter said in their report: "It is clear that Thinking Skills are embedded within the culture of Furzeham Primary School. Curriculum policy documents and plans clearly map out a thinking strategy that subsequently feed into teaching strategies, and so moves thinking approaches from policy to practice.

"Thinking Skills are embedded within the culture of Furzeham Primary School. Thinking serves as a 'golden thread' throughout the school. The school's Learning and Teaching approach is built on evidence-based cognitive principles from the Science of Learning,

embracing elements such as cognitive load and memory/schema development. It is understood that learning does not stop at the school gates but continues into our everyday life

"With this in mind, Furzeham Primary and Nursery School provides parents with helpful information to support their children's learning at home."

Claire Thompson, Deputy Head at the school, who led the school's application to achieve the Thinking Schools Accreditation, said: "It's been such a rewarding journey leading this accreditation process. The dedication from our team and the enthusiasm from the pupils has been incredible."



We are all very excited to travel up to London and perform in such a notorious Theatre, such an opportunity is rare, and we are incredibly grateful.

"I am honoured to have had the chance to perform 'The Periodicals' again, as its message is a very important topic which I feel should be talked about more within the education system."

Their talents extended beyond the stage, with


some students taking on roles in lighting and sound operation, highlighting their versatility and commitment to the production.

Nonetheless, our results days were full of stories and excitement about next step


opportunities for all our students - many of whom will continue onto sixth form within our trust.





Artsmark School Success and Trust Ambitions

Celebrating Artsmark Success at Meon Way Federation, Rochester Grammar School and New Horizons Primary School

Three schools from the Thinking Schools Academy Trust - Meon Way Federation, New Horizons Primary School, and Rochester Grammar School - have been recognised with prestigious Artsmark Awards for their commitment to arts and cultural education.

Meon Way Federation, which includes Meon Infant School, Moorings Way Infant School, and Meon Junior School, has made significant strides in arts education. Meon Infant and Moorings Way received the Artsmark Silver award, while Meon Junior School earned the Gold award. These accolades highlight the schools' dedication to delivering a comprehensive arts curriculum that fosters creativity among their students.

Artsmark, supported by Arts Council England, celebrates schools nationwide for their efforts in promoting arts and cultural education, enriching students' learning experiences across all subjects.

The recognition of Meon Way Federation schools reflects their strong commitment to arts education. Moorings Way Infant School's report praised its cultural inclusivity, noting that the school actively engaged local artists and considered the diversity of students' experiences. Meon Infant School was commended for integrating the arts into core subjects such as History, Science, and English, ensuring that every child has foundational knowledge before beginning new topics.

Elsewhere in Portsmouth, New Horizons Primary School also achieved the Artsmark Silver award. Their report commended the school's efforts to provide consistent and meaningful arts experiences both inside and outside the classroom. The Artsmark assessor praised the school's partnerships with local arts and cultural organisations and noted that students benefit from arts activities both in and out of the classroom.

Initiatives like the 'Winter Showcase', new facilities for dance and art, and an art installation project inspired by Yinka Shonibare were particularly commended.





The school has supported their staff to feel confident in their teachings of the arts and are being provided with the relevant training to support this change in curriculum, from within the school and across the Thinking Schools Academy Trust.

The report commented: "[Rochester Grammar School has seen staff confidence increase across the school in untraditional creative subjects through internal support and planning, and modelling from the practitioners you have worked with. [The school's] specialist teaching staff are accessing relevant CPD, and it's good to hear how some staff have governance roles for local arts and cultural organisations, and are leading within the MAT."

The report continued to commend the support that the school receives from their Senior Leaders and Governing body, saying: "There is SLT and governor support, and the arts are a driver in school values and planning."

These Artsmark awards celebrate the remarkable achievements of the Trust's schools in fostering arts education. As a Trust, there is an ambition for all schools to be Artsmark accredited, demonstrating a unified commitment to arts and cultural education across the network.

What's more, New Horizons Primary School have been crowned with our 'Highest Fundraising School Award' for 2024, raising a mega, £4,464.90.

"We had 15 schools (participate) this year, with 6 being from TSAT. 31% of this year's income has come through TSAT schools, with the final amount reaching £27,160.13. Another record, up from £15.6k last year which is amazing. Thank you to every school for their support."

Samuel Poole, communications officer at the Thinking Schools Academy Trust, said: "Having worked with Tim and the team at Diabetes Research and Wellness Foundation for some years now, it has been fantastic to see their Dance for Diabetes event grow from strength to strength.

"When I had the pleasure to photograph their Meon Way Federation event in 2023, I was driven to see all our Portsmouth primary schools involved so made the relevant introductions between the charity and school staff, and we achieved exactly that. This fundraiser is a brilliant initiative to support our schools to raise money to achieve their mission in Transforming Life Chances, while also doing good for another fantastic cause. Well done to everyone involved."

Dance for Diabetes will be back for 2025, with an ambition to extend this project to benefit other schools within the various TSAT regions.

Southsea Coastal Scheme

Southsea Coastal Scheme deliver workshop to show benefits of sea defences to New Horizons Primary School

Pupils from New Horizons Primary School have been learning about the effects and benefits of sea defences, following a visit from the Southsea Coastal Scheme who are leading on the coastal defences project to protect businesses and homes from flooding.

Year 5 and 6 pupils at the school have been introduced to the UK's largest local authority-led coastal defence project, worth more than £180m and the positive impact it will have on more than 10,000 homes across the city.

The pupils received a visual demonstration of the impact different sea defences can have through the use of a wave tank, helping a complicated and engineering-heavy project to be simplified for young minds to understand.

Sophie Carter, who delivered the session and works for the contractor delivering on the Southsea Coastal Scheme, said it's important to raise awareness about what is happening along the seafront.

She said: "We take our wave tank into schools to raise awareness about this coastal defence project, whilst also explaining to the children what we're doing to protect the environment

and sea life within our work.

"Our visit is also an opportunity to touch on climate change and help the children understand the link between building new sea defences and the reasons why we're there; sea levels are rising, there are bigger risks of storms which can lead to flooding. We use the wave tank as a visual way of showing them how the different sea defences will work when they're built, and why we're using different types of sea defences in different parts of Southsea seafront."

The team who delivers these sessions to schools across Portsmouth also believes this workshop is a positive way to broaden the minds of pupils to explore different types of careers available.

Rena, from Portsmouth City Council who helps promote this project, said: "We have had a really good response from schools across the city who have been contacting us for this demonstration. At the beginning of this project, we used to reach out to many organisations to go and talk to them, and now they come to us, so it is lovely to see that we have become popular with these kinds of events which inspire young people."





Communication Without Limits



Tree Tops specialist deaf provision helps to teach and support children with severe hearing loss

All Faiths Children's Academy is proud to have a specialist deaf provision called Tree Tops, where they teach and support children with severe hearing loss. Tree Tops uses a Total Communication approach where pupils can learn and communicate effectively to achieve their goals. This resource provision supports up to 25 deaf pupils from Nursery to Year 6, all of whom will have an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) with a severe to profound hearing loss as their primary need.

Tree tops pupils are included in all aspects of school life and learn alongside their age-related peers. As a wider school, children are taught BSL as a foreign language and participate in events such as Sign2Sing and Deaf Awareness Week; this allows all students within the school to be able to communicate effectively with one another.

These kindly donated signs celebrate and educate the school community about British Sign Language, teaching our students key terms and phrases that they can use to communicate with their peers. They are

proudly displayed around the playground area, making them accessible to everyone.

One of the newly certified coaches, Jane Backhouse from The Portsmouth Academy, shared her positive experience: "The BASIC coaching course was a great introduction to coaching colleagues. I have been able to then draw on this approach in my coaching work and can use

this alongside other strategies such as the Walkthrus coaching programme."

The BASIC Coaching programme provides a structured method for coaches to facilitate effective conversations, guide reflection, and promote solution-focused thinking.

As a result, coaches can offer meaningful support tailored to the specific needs of their colleagues, whether they are navigating classroom challenges, leadership roles or administrative tasks.

Building on the success of the initial cohort, a new group of aspiring coaches has now commenced their journey through the programme.

They aim to achieve certification by the summer, further expanding the Trust's capacity to provide high-quality coaching support across all schools and roles. This growth in coaching expertise strengthens the Trust's ongoing commitment to fostering a supportive, collaborative, and continuously improving environment for both staff and students.









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
