Modern Slavery Statement

Introduction

The Thinking Schools Academy Trust is a non-profit making charitable company limited by guarantee, registered in Chatham, Medway.

The Thinking Schools Academy Trust, is made up of a family of schools that work together to “improve the life chances” of all our children and young people. We share a common mission to nurture successful children who are confident and can think and act independently.

At the heart of The Thinking Schools Academy Trust is the belief that the work that we do must transform the life chances of students.

We believe that the best way to transform life chances is to actively shape the minds, attitudes and habits of young people through a framework of cognitive education that enables them to become the master of their own destiny.

The ultimate goal is that every individual, child or adult, in the organisation consciously recognises their own habits, strengths and areas for development and actively seeks to improve themselves, thereby creating transformational change in each individual.

From September 2023 there are 26 academies in our Trust covering four regions; Southeast, East, South and the South West. The Thinking Schools Academy Trust is made up of schools including Primary Schools, Grammar Schools, High Schools, Comprehensive Schools & PRU provisions. We have circa. 16,0000 students and 2,200 staff across our Trust.

Commitment

This statement sets out the Thinking Schools Academy Trusts actions to understand all potential modern slavery and human trafficking risks related to its activity and to put in place steps that are aimed at ensuring that there is no slavery or human trafficking in our business and our supply chains.

The Thinking Schools Academy Trust is committed to ensuring there is no slavery or human trafficking in our supply chains. We recognise our responsibility to take a robust approach to slavery and human trafficking, ensuring that we are fully compliant with the Modern Slavery Act 2015.

We are committed to the highest ethical standards in all our activities and will make continuous improvements in these areas. We believe there is a low risk of slavery or human trafficking having a connection with our activities.

Employment Legislation

The Trust works primarily with UK-based suppliers and contractors and employees are protected under UK employment legislation and working time directive. The Trust does not directly conduct business in countries where there is a documented problem with human trafficking or slavery. We are aware of the need to ensure that companies within our supply chain share our commitment to treating employees fairly and ethically.

Supply chains

All schools have access to the same level of support and services provided by the Trust, we pride ourselves on the high quality of these support services. The Trust has its own central services team that provide the following services;

- Thinking Personnel
- Thinking Finance
- Thinking Technology
- Thinking Facilities
- Thinking Fitness
- Thinking Creative

The Trusts supply chains are predominantly drawn from the following services;

- Cleaning contracts
- Catering contracts
- Construction/building works
- Education supply staff
- Self-employed education support services
- Education and office equipment suppliers
- ICT equipment suppliers

We have identified that some of our procurement could take place within sectors where modern slavery offences could occur, such as within our cleaning and catering supply chains and within the construction industry.

As part of our cleaning contract conditions, contractors are required to sign and agree with our declaration relating to modern slavery and human trafficking.

Risk Assessment

High risk activities:

- We do not believe there are any high-risk operations within the Trust or within our supply chains in regards to slavery and human trafficking.

Medium risk activities:

- Supply chains linked to catering and cleaning provisions as result of the use of external contractors.
- Supply chains linked to the manufacturing of ICT equipment, education and office supplies and the use of external suppliers who may manufacture overseas.
- The use of external contractors for construction and building.

Low risk:

- The use of self-employed education services or external supply agencies.
